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# **From the Principal**

#### **Staffing**

Staffing remains consistent in this latter part of Term 1. Mr Blake Davies has transferred across to the Learning Support Team, and Mr Charles Francis has joined the PDHPE Faculty in the short term.

Next Term the Department is re-aligning the structure of schools into smaller educational areas, following the employment across the state of 40 additional Directors. Sadly, Kingsgrove is losing Mr Christopher Charles as our Director, as he is moving to the north side of the city. On behalf of the Kingsgrove school community, I would like to wish him well in his move and thank him for the enormous and continued support which he has supplied the school in recent years.

#### Assessment

Year 12 students are now well settled into their HSC Courses. Some students have 'fine-tuned' their study programs, reducing their study load to 10 units, whilst others have maintained 11 or 12 units. Students have been studying their HSC Courses during Term 4 2017, and Term 1 2018. This means Year 12 mid-course examinations are about to commence.

Exam timetables have been published, and student briefings have been held with students to discuss and clarify exam rules and conduct. Thank you to Ms Sotiria Pagones and Mr Denni Fourfouris for their organisation. Mr Fourfouris will be providing important information about exam requirements, conduct, and exam rules and procedures. This will shortly be posted on the web.

Teachers have written these important mid-course examinations, and will soon be marking and providing essential feedback to their students. Year 12 Half Yearly reports will soon be due, and then the midyear important three way Parent-Teacher interviews with meetings with Year 12, Year 12 families and teachers.

I wish all Year 12 all the best for their exams!

Ms Belinda Jang and Ms Lisa Harvey are supporting all students as the Year 12 Advisers. Please remember to pass on any changes in family dynamics that may be impacting on your Year 12 child.

As Year 12 DP, Ms Sofo has met with Year 12 to discuss with them formal HSC exam requirements for later in the year, and provided a hard copy document which can be found at the Higher School Certificate (HSC) Rules and Procedures <u>guide</u>. I ask all Year 12 parents to carefully read sections:

- 3.4 Applying for disability provisions
- 5.1 Attending your exams (particularly the section on illness and/or misadventure)
- 5.5 Applying for illness/misadventure

The school has similar procedures here at school. Please contact Ms Kristina Pami (Learning Support Teacher) if you seek further advice about disability provisions (particularly for the HSC). Ms Eve Tsevekidis (Head Teacher, Teaching and Learning) coordinates all illness and misadventure requests at school level.

#### Easter Holidays

The Easter long weekend falls during the school term this year, with Good Friday on Friday, 30 March, and Easter Monday on Monday, 2 April. The school will obviously be closed for the Easter long weekend.

#### School Holidays

Students are always looking forward to their next term break and I am sure this term is no exception. I remind parents and carers that:

- Term 1 finishes on Friday, 13 April.
- The two week Autumn Term Break concludes on Sunday, 29 April.
- Term 2 School Development Day is on Monday, 30 April. This is sometimes called the 'pupil free day'.
- All students return to school on Tuesday, 1 May. This will be a week A.
- The first week back in every term is a 'Week A' on the timetable.

#### Change in weather and uniform

As we head to the end of Term 1 the weather becomes cooler. In past days we have had some cooler mornings and a lot of rain, after weeks of hot and humid weather, but the days remain fine.

I remind all parents that students are expected to be in full school uniform at all times. This means jumpers should be school jumpers, with the school emblem on the chest. Inappropriate jumpers, such as 'hoodies', and with brand names should not be worn. Uniform passes will not be given for these types of garments, and I anticipate the school will provide students with a warm replacement from our clothing pool.

It is also important that students wear warm and protective footwear. The P&C (as our representative parent body) strongly endorse our uniform. Black leather shoes offer sound protection, and also warmth. I encourage parents and carers to ensure their child is well dressed and neat for school.

#### <u>Sport</u>

Sport is always very popular at Kingsgrove, and our sport coordinator is Ms Kahli Vojkovic. I thank her for all her tireless work each week in ensuring sport is well organised and planned. Sadly, we have now had some wet Wednesdays, and this has impacted on Wednesday sport. Summer sport for Term 1 is about to come to an end, and winter Sport commence next term. Ms Vojkovic has done an admirable job leading and coordinating summer sport through Term 1, and has now put in place organisation for winter sport for Terms 2 and 3.

I would also like to thank all the teachers who have been training, coaching and taking students to all the various knockout competitions between Kingsgrove and other schools in our zone.

The school has been strongly represented in the Swimming Carnivals. Please see the Sport Report elsewhere.

#### Properties Update

Over the past weeks the Department has again supported the school with two properties initiatives – new carpeting and vinyl in many parts of the school, and painting. The school is now looking very fresh.

Mr Evans continues to be very proactive in organising the cleaning of the school, with concrete and pathway cleaning and chewing gum removal. I would like to impress on all students, and ask for parental support, that chewing gum is completely banned from KHS.

We have also refurbished the school's Administrative Office area. It now looks very modern!

Many students and parents will be pleased to hear about the commencement of work on the Basket Ball courts. Ms Sofo provides information elsewhere in the report. It is due to commence this week, but inclement weather may impact on, or delay work.

Early Leave - Collection of Students The school has recently had family members phone in at very short notice to request that their child be sent out to meet them, to leave school early.

We are concerned and have worries about this, as we are not able to verify who is calling, nor where the student is going.

The school's process for parents/carers to request that their child is to leave school early is to submit all requests in writing before school. If there is a need to verify details, staff will contact families by telephone for additional information.

Clearly, in an emergency, we ask parents/ carers to come straight to the office, and not to telephone or text their child, and the office staff will call their child from class.

#### Year 5 and 6 Open Night

We had a wonderful turnout at our recent Open Night on Tuesday, March 6. I would like to thank all parents who came along and visited our school. The feedback was very rewarding, and as we tried something completely different, we were keen to get the feedback. I would also like to thank and acknowledge Ms Sofo and Mr Evans for the assistance and organisation of the night. The organisation and promotion of the night were perfect! The musical items were of great credit to our student performers, and the Music Faculty, and as always, the slide presentations, were exemplar.

The student presenters were outstanding and all from Year 8 - Zane Kennedy, Mickey Hageali, and Anastasia Tsakaridis.

The Prefects were word perfect and great ambassadors of the school, leading tours, speaking to parents and to Year 5 and 6 students. They are a wonderful asset to the school and well led by Ms Harvey.

Staff presentations were spot on engaging, informative, and of great importance to our visitors. Parents gave very positive verbal feedback.

I would like to thank all the Faculties that did major presentations, with so many teaching staff present. Thank you to the Head Teachers who led their individual presentations.

And of course, thank you to the SAS staff who did so many things behind the scenes, to make it work! We look forward to meeting our Year 6 enrolees later in the year.

# Deputy Principals' Report

What a wonderful start to the year we have had at Kingsgrove. Students have settled well into the school routine and are adhering to our 'common language' of 'WEAR IT PROUD', 'RIGHT PLACE; RIGHT TIME' and 'OFF AND OUT OF SIGHT' as described in the last edition of Communicator.

We have continued to improve the amenity of the school and recently completed signage installation throughout the school. This included external signage to buildings and internal signage for the identification of all rooms.

Again, we have had most of our concrete paths and stairwells cleaned, including the removal of chewing gum. This has brightened the school amenity and improved the hygiene. Students have been reminded that chewing gum is a banned item at school and I would ask that our school community supports us in maintaining this cleaner environment.

Whilst on the subject of banned items, I would like to draw your attention to your child's diary; page 6 lists items that are prohibited at school. This includes textas, stink bombs, glass bottles, spray cans, chewing gum, fire crackers, speaker boxes, hi-energy drinks, laser lights and electronic smoking devices.

Whilst the great majority of students respect and adhere to this, occasionally

one or other of these items will appear and severe consequences may result. Please assist the school and your child by ensuring that these items don't come to school.

When the warm weather recently turned wet some of our students arrived in nonschool jumpers and jackets. I'll take this opportunity to remind all families that the 'Wear It Proud' catch-cry refers to all students wearing full school uniform at all times, whilst at school or on school business.

Our uniform code is supported by the staff, parents and students and variations are NOT acceptable. As Term 2 approaches, so does the cooler and wetter weather, it is timely to ensure that your child has a school jumper and/or jacket ready for the change in weather.

## SOCIAL SCIENCE FACULTY REPORT

#### **Change**

2018 sees many new challenges for the Social Science Faculty and the students we teach. It is the second year of the new National Curriculum for Junior Geography and whilst we have settled into delivery of new concepts for Years 7 and 9, Years 8 and 10 are our first cohort being delivered the new syllabi. Junior Geography students are learning the following in 2018:

#### Year 7:

<u>Landscapes and Landforms</u> – Students learn to understand and explain the processes that shape our landforms and landscapes.

<u>Place and Liveability</u> – Students learn the features and characteristics of places and people's perceptions of the liveability of them.

#### Year 8:

<u>Water in the World</u> – Students examine water as a resource, its value, scarcity and ways of overcoming it.

<u>Interconnections</u> – Students focus on the connections people have with different places, the activities they perform there and how they sustain these locations.

#### Year 9:

<u>Sustainable Biomes</u> – Students investigate the physical characteristics and productivity of biomes, learning what they produce and what the world needs to produce.

<u>Changing Places</u> – Students examine the patterns and trends in population movements and the increasing urbanisation of countries.

#### Year 10:

<u>Environmental Change & Management</u> – Students investigate the functioning of environments and the scale of human induced environmental change challenging sustainability. <u>Human Wellbeing</u> – Students examine the differences in human wellbeing and development that exist within and between countries.

#### <u>Personnel</u>

2018 sees continued change in our faculty personnel. Ms Leanne Thomas decided at the start of the year to resign from teaching and is taking up a new challenge in focusing on her own small business. We are sad to see her leave as her enthusiasm and desire to extend students will be missed.

#### <u>Assessment</u>

We are now reaching the time of year when most students are being issued their first assessment tasks. In Social Science every student is supported to do their personal best. Junior Geography classes have all received their first assessment task as listed below:

- Year 7: Mapping Task due the week of 26 29 March
- Year 8: Natural Hazards Task 8G1 and 8G3 due 21 March, 8G5 due 22 March
- Year 9: Ecosystems Powerpoint Task – due 21 March
- Year 10: In Class Comprehension Task on 19 March
- 9 Commerce: Technology Task due week of 3 - 6 April

#### Class expectations

I have been happy to see that students have returned this year with correct uniform and a range of equipment.

All students should come to school each day with the correct books for the classes they have and a pencil case with everything they could need for the day.

Students must make sure they submit tasks on time. We regularly contact parents to convey concerns over non-

## HISTORY

The study of history provides students with a knowledge and understanding of historical periods, societies, individuals and events which have helped shape the world we live in today.

At Kingsgrove High School, all students are required to study History across Years 7 – 10. There is a mandatory study of Australian History in Stage 5 and Civics and Citizenship studies are embedded into all programs.

In the Junior Years, students complete the following topics.

*Year 7* – What is History, and Ancient Societies

**Year 8** – Ancient to the Modern World, Viking Society, Middle Ages and Japan **Year 9** –The Industrial Age, World War I and Movement of Peoples **Year 10** –World War II, Migrant experiences and the Vietnam War

In Years 9 and 10, students may also choose to study History Elective and/or Marine Studies as elective subject choices.

In the senior years, students have the opportunity to continue their study of History for the HSC, with both Ancient and Modern History being popular choices. In addition, History Extension is offered as an additional unit for students with a particular talent and interest in this subject in Year 12.

Work Studies, Psychology and Studies of Religion are additional choices offered by the History Faculty in Years 11 and 12.

#### Excursions

Site studies are an important component of Stages 4, 5 and 6 and provide students with the opportunity to examine historical and culturally significant locations.

Over many years, the History faculty has coordinated a range of excursions for local, inter-state and international destinations.

#### **Critical Thinking**

Helping your child with literacy in the middle years of schooling: Years 7 and 8

#### What is Critical Thinking?

In the Australian Curriculum, students develop capability in critical and creative thinking as they learn to generate and evaluate knowledge, clarify concepts and ideas, seek possibilities, consider alternatives and solve problems. Critical and creative thinking are integral to activities that require students to think broadly and deeply using skills, behaviours and dispositions such as reason, logic, resourcefulness, imagination and innovation in all learning areas at school and in their lives beyond school. For information, go to www.australiancurriculum.edu.au/

How could you foster critical thinking at home?

- You can do this by asking questions and using language that need deeper thought. Using words such as *compare, analyse, predict, give examples* may encourage more thought and promote conversation.
- Help your child to use precise wording rather than making generalisations.
- Encourage looking at a situation, event or issue from another person's point of view. The old expression to 'step into someone else's shoes' is often very beneficial in helping a child see another person's perspective.
- Ask your child to find a solution rather than providing one yourself. Ask your child about his or her own thinking about a situation or issue.
- You could also choose wording that encourages thinking and planning. Here are some examples that you might try:
  - Help me understand why you chose to ... (here you could insert a recent event)
  - What do we need to take with us when we go to the library, to the movies or on the picnic?
  - How do you feel about what happened in the news?
  - Do you agree with what you just heard on the radio or TV? And then later ask: Can you explain why?

#### Scholarships - Steps for Application

With research to do, forms to fill out and deadlines to meet, there's no doubt that applying for a <u>scholarship</u> can be tricky. If you're in the midst of scholarship applications or need some pointers to help you get started, working your way through our five-step checklist of scholarship tips will put your mind ease.

1. Have you researched your options? The very first step in applying for a scholarship is to research your options so that you have a full picture of the scholarships available, including who offers them, what they cover and for how long. There are three sources of scholarships: education providers, the federal government and private organisations. Many are awarded for academic merit, but others target students in specific fields of study, reward students for community involvement or aim to encourage educational participation from certain groups, such as women entering nontraditional fields, students from low socioeconomic backgrounds or those who attended schools that are underrepresented in tertiary education. Pay careful attention to scholarship requirements, which may include a certain ATAR/OP; scholarship durations; and any specific conditions that may affect continued eligibility, such as needing to maintain a specific academic average. Create a list of the scholarships you are interested in (and eligible for) and relevant details. Make sure that you have explored all your options, including scholarships for lesser amounts or shorter durations — after all, it's better to receive some sponsorship rather than none at all.

2. Do you understand the application process?

Once you have compiled a list of scholarships you are interested in, you will need to check their application methods and make sure that you understand the process. In most cases, you will be able to apply online or by post. If you are applying for a scholarship though an education provider, you should check whether your application needs to be submitted directly to the provider or through the Tertiary Admissions Centre (TAC) in your state. Remember that some education provider scholarships don't require an application — you will be considered automatically upon applying for a place. You may be required to supply additional documents, such as an academic transcript, a scholarship cover letter or financial records, and some may require you to attend an interview. You should make sure that you are supplying the correct documents and in the required format (a certified copy, for instance). If you have any questions about the scholarship application process, do not hesitate to contact the scholarship provider — it's better to be safe than sorry!

3. Have you noted down deadlines? Scholarships attract huge numbers of applications, so you will not be considered if you miss a closing date. It helps to write down the dates on a calendar or input the deadlines into your phone, perhaps setting yourself reminders closer to the submission date. This is especially important if you are submitting multiple applications, to different providers and by different application methods. Remember to allow time to complete each application, including the time it takes to source evidentiary documents and submit them (if by post). You should also ask providers when you can expect to hear back about the outcome of your application.

## 4. Have you triple-checked your application?

It's all too easy to make mistakes when closing dates are looming, so it's crucial that you give your applications a thorough read-over before they are submitted. Common mistakes relate to spelling and grammar issues, lack of detail, poor presentation and failure to follow instructions (a specified word count, for example). Unfortunately, a simple mistake might result in your application landing in the 'no' pile. If you can, ask a friend or parent to look over your application before it is submitted. A fresh pair of eyes can work wonders!

5. Do you have a back-up plan? Scholarships are very competitive, so it helps to have a back-up plan in case your applications aren't successful. You might consider taking on a part-time job or applying for government assistance (such as Youth Allowance, Austudy or ABSTUDY) or investigating scholarships that will be available in future application periods. If you are a first-year student, keep in mind that many scholarships are offered to students continuing their studies in their second or subsequent enrolment year. Taking out a student loan from your institution or a bank may be another option, but keep in mind that there may be conditions attached (for example, institution loans are generally only offered to cover 'essentials' such as a new laptop or unexpected utility bill)

## NAPLAN Online – information for parents and carers



### 2018

#### Why do students do NAPLAN tests?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life.

Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in the annual NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

The tests provide parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. NAPLAN tests are just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process; they do not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance.

NAPLAN tests also provide schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are meeting important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

#### What will be tested?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum. All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN materials.

In 2018, for the first time, some students will sit NAPLAN online. To get an idea of what the tests look like, visit the public demonstration site at nap.edu.au/online-assessment/public-demonstration-site

NAPLAN Online will not be a test of keyboard skills. There are variations in how fast and well a student can type – just as there are variations in how fast and well a student can write by hand. Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing test on paper.

## How can I help my child prepare for NAPLAN?

Help your child prepare for NAPLAN by reassuring them that the tests are just one part of their school program, and by reminding them on the day to simply try their best. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance. Ensuring students are familiar with using devices, typing on them and navigating through programs are a part of student learning and a requirement of the Australian Curriculum from the first year at school.

ACARA does not recommend the use of services by coaching providers or excessive preparation. NAPLAN is not about passing or failing, but about assessing learning progress.

#### Will my child sit NAPLAN on paper or online?

#### Your child will sit the NAPLAN online tests in 2018.

However, children in some other schools across Australia will sit the NAPLAN paper tests this year. Federal, state and territory education ministers have agreed that NAPLAN will move online over the next two to three years. State and territory education authorities will determine when their schools move online.

NAPLAN Online uses an adaptive test design, which presents questions that better match student achievement levels and provide more precise results for teachers and schools. As students are presented with questions that test the same range of difficulty, regardless of whether they complete the test online or on paper, results for both formats will be reported on the same NAPLAN assessment scale.

#### **Participation in NAPLAN**

All students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 are expected to participate in the annual NAPLAN tests.

Students with disability may qualify for adjustments that reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments. Where applicable, you should first discuss the use of any disability adjustments for your child with your child's teacher.

A formal exemption may be granted for a student with significant intellectual disability and/or significant coexisting conditions, or for a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on NAPLAN Online disability adjustments or the process required to gain a formal exemption.

#### NAPLAN Online 2018 tests timetable

The test window for NAPLAN Online is extended from three days provided for the paper test to nine days to give schools more flexibility in scheduling and accommodate schools that may have fewer devices. The NAPLAN Online test window starts on Tuesday 15 May and finishes on Friday 25 May.

The online tests must be taken in the following order:

Numeracy	Year 3: 45 min. Year 5: 50 min. Year 7: 60 min Year 9: 60 min.	To be competed after the conventions of language test	This test includes number and algebra; measurement and geometry; and statistics and probability

## What if my child is absent from school on test days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule. Individual students are not permitted to sit NAPLAN online tests after Friday 25 May 2018.

## How is my child's performance measured?

Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each test. A result at the national minimum standard indicates that the student has demonstrated the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level. The performance of individual students can be compared to the average performance of all students in Australia.

A NAPLAN report will be issued by your school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your school.

#### How are NAPLAN test results used?

- Students and parents may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help them better identify students who require greater challenges or additional support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and weaknesses in teaching programs and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review programs and support offered to schools.
