# Presentation Day 2018

I invite all families to celebrate with us their children's academic, cultural and sporting success at our annual Presentation Day. It will be held in the KHS School Hall, on Thursday 13 December. Invitations are progressively being sent out as we identify our students receiving awards. Parents and carers are then invited to join us in the school Library for a light lunch.

## Assessment and Reporting

The school has now almost completed most assessment of Years 7 to 10, and teachers have been busily writing reports for all their classes. Year 11 reports for the end of Preliminary course were issued earlier in the term, and Year 11 are now progressively attempting their first HSC Assessment Tasks for most courses across these current weeks. I wish them all the best in their studies.

Year 7 to 10 reports will be issued to students on Friday, 14 December.

# Year 7 – 10 Clearance

This year we will continue a 'clearance' process for each Year group. Each week a different Year group is issued with a clearance form, with all their subjects listed.

Students need to complete clearance of all their responsibilities – returning texts and library resources, and any borrowed materials. All fees will also need to be finalised. It was a lovely night for students and staff to celebrate the end of the Class of 2018 formal secondary education.

## **HSC** Results

The HSC results will be released on Thursday, 13 December, and the ATAR (for those seeking an ATAR for university entrance) will be released on Friday, 14 December. As a farewell to Year 12, we invite them to attend a light and informal Morning Tea, to discuss their results and advise us of their ATARs.

Ms Jang will be coordinating this and will liaise with students through email.

## **HSC Credentials**

From Wednesday 19 December 2018, students can download their NESA credential as a free PDF via their **Student's Online** account. The HSC credentials will include an HSC Testamur, a Record of Achievement detailing students' Year 12, Year 11 and Year 10 results, and personalised course reports for relevant HSC courses. After downloading, students need to remember to save or print their credentials as their Student's Online account will only remain open until 30 June, 2019.

Parents and students can view examples of the **HSC credentials**.

In addition to their free HSC credential as a PDF, eligible students will receive a hard copy HSC Testamur in the post within the week beginning 21 January, 2019. Students can order a further copy of their HSC Testamur or a printed copy of their HSC Credential Package, including Record of Achievement and course reports, via their **Student's Online** account for a small fee.

# End of School

Students (and staff!) are looking forward to their summer vacation! We will be celebrating our annual 'Presentation Day' on Thursday, 13 December in the school Hall.

Students are to attend school in the last weeks, with classes concluding on Wednesday, 19 December, at 2.20 pm.

#### Remember:

- Kingsgrove High School operates under a two week, cyclical timetable, with Week 1 always being a Week A, and then Week 2 being a Week B, and so on. We always start each term with a 'Week A'.
- New individualised timetables will be issued to students on their first day next year.
- Tuesday afternoons conclude at 2.20 pm as Period 6 is a staff meeting.
- Wednesdays conclude at 2.20 pm due to Sport.
- Year 11 and 12 may have flexible timetables with 8.00 am starts with 'Period 0', and finish earlier in the day as compensation. Some senior students may leave early on Tuesday and Wednesday.

# Year 7 (2019) Orientation

I would like to thank the two year advisers, Ms Robyn Ford and Ms Vanessa Bell for their organisation of these two important days. On Tuesday 27 November we welcomed our Year 6 students to their first visit to our high school on Transition Day, and we looked forward to meeting all our Year 6 students and their families here at school on Tuesday 4 December, starting at 9.30 am in the school Hall. It was a very full day for staff, students, Prefects and Year 10 Peer Support Leaders.

I would also like to thank the Year 10 Peer Support Leaders who will be

assisting Year 6 on Orientation Day, and into next year, and their teacher coordinator Ms Vanessa Bell and Mr Toby Long for their leadership.

# Organisation for 2019

Next year, Kingsgrove High School will be changing the structure of our school day. 'Roll Call' as a standalone administrative process will be abolished. Students attendance will be marked present for the day in their first lesson, each day. Students will arrive at school and attend their first lesson at 8.50 am. They must be on time and at class to commence learning at 8.50 am.

This roll will be used to mark student attendance for the day, and to advise parents that their child is absent / late, through our text message system.

(If a student is late the student still needs to attend the Administrative Office with a parent note to explain their lateness.)

School will still finish at the same time each day, as in past years. Please see the attached Bell Times for a 2019 summary.

## Vacation Leave

If you are going to be taking an extended vacation, and your child will be returning to school later than Wednesday or Thursday, 30 or 31 January, the school needs to be notified in writing this term, of your proposed return date. This may be by letter or email.

Organisation and planning is now well underway for the first week of return in 2019.

# Staff Changes

Every year staff members are successful in gaining transfers and moves to other schools, to be closer to home, to gain promotion, or take leave for a range of reasons. Other staff chose to retire or resign from the Department. I already know some staff's plans and wish them all well for 2019. Next year I will publish a comprehensive list of staff changes. I know that we are already filling three new permanent teaching positions.

Positive Behaviour For Learning (PBL) In 2019 Kingsgrove is moving to the PBL approach. A lot of planning is in place, and a cross-school team of 13 staff have been working diligently getting organisation in place. We will provide more advice next year.

Special Religious Education (SRE)
SRE, previously known as 'Scripture' is conducted at KHS every Tuesday. For many years, students attend SRE on a Tuesday in Period 6. We currently have up to 10 students who attend SRE.

Year 7 students and new students are surveyed on enrolment. Families may 'opt in' or 'opt out' at any time, and need to submit all notification in writing to the school.

# 2019 Expectations

With the change to our day's Structure, we will be strongly impressing on students the need to be in the "Right place, right time!" Similarly, we expect all students to be in full uniform, at all times. As we head to the end of this year we are aware that uniform is wearing out, and students are growing out of it. Next year, please ensure that your child is ready with all uniform for the start of 2019, including BLACK LEATHER school shoes.

Please discuss the importance of being ready for school, including having breakfast, preparing all learning equipment, and as importantly, wearing correct uniform each day. Black sport shoes are not appropriate, unless they are full leather. Please note that jeans style pants, track suit pants and variations of the uniform are not acceptable.

We look forward to starting the new school year with all students attending every day, on time!

# Tip: Helping your child achieve success at school next year.

Parents can offer their child support by:

- Providing a good place to study. Ideally it should be quiet, a comfortable temperature, with good ventilation, good lighting, adequate desk or table space and free from distractions such as TV, noise, telephone, interesting conversations, little brothers and sisters.
- Discussing your child's work with them and helping them to 'keep on track'.

- Providing good, balanced meals.
- Encouraging sensible levels of sleep and some form of regular exercise.

Recently, Mr Evans had the privilege to be involved in our second annual Year 4 Gifted and Talented Taster Day. Year 4 students from our local primary schools were invited to attend KHS to participate in lessons in a number of Key Learning Areas that were thought provoking and required some higher order thinking skills to resolve. # **OUR SUBJECTS - VISUAL ARTS & MUSIC**



Visual Arts builds an understanding of the role of art, in all forms of media, in contemporary and historical cultures and visual worlds. The subject serves to facilitate the interpretation of such information. It places a high regard on how students develop an informed point of view and encourages tolerance, diversity and empathy between students, teachers and others in the expression of different points of view.



In Music, students develop knowledge, skills and understanding in performing, composing and listening to music. By singing, playing and moving, they learn music of different styles and from different times and cultures. They also learn to organise sound into musical compositions using concepts such as pitch, duration, and dynamics.

# Performance Programs we offer:

- Choir
- Rock Band

# Top 10 skills children learn from the Creative and Preforming Arts

**Creativity** – Being able to think on your feet, approach tasks from different perspectives and think 'outside of the box' will distinguish your child from others. In a Creative Arts program, your child may be asked to recite a monologue in six different ways, create a painting that represents a memory, or compose a new rhythm to enhance a piece of music. If children have practice thinking creatively, it will come naturally to them now and in their future career.





**Confidence** – The skills developed through Performance, not only train you how to convincingly deliver a message, but also build the confidence you need to take command of the stage. Performance training gives children practice stepping out of their comfort zone and allows them to make mistakes and learn from them in rehearsal. This process gives children the confidence to perform in front of large audiences.

**Problem Solving** – Artistic creations are born through the solving of problems. How do I turn this clay into a sculpture? How do I portray a particular emotion through dance? How will my character react in this situation? Without even realising it students who participate in the arts are consistently being challenged to solve problems. All this practice problem solving develops children's skills in reasoning and understanding. This will help develop important problem-solving skills necessary for success in any career.

**Perseverance** – When a child picks up a violin for the first time, she/he knows that playing Bach right away is not an option; however, when that child practices, learns the skills and techniques and doesn't give up, that Bach concerto is that much closer. In an increasingly competitive world, where people are being asked to continually develop new skills, perseverance is essential for achieving success.

Focus – The ability to focus is a key skill developed through ensemble work. Keeping a balance between listening and contributing involves a great deal of concentration and focus. It requires each participant to not only think about their role, but how their role contributes to the big picture of what is being created. Recent research has shown that participation in the arts improves children's abilities to concentrate and focus in other aspects of their lives.



**Non-Verbal Communication** – Through experiences in Performance, students learn to breakdown the mechanics of body language. They experience different ways of moving and how those movements communicate different emotions. They are then coached in performance skills to ensure they are portraying their character effectively to the audience.

**Receiving Constructive Feedback** – Receiving constructive feedback about a performance or visual art piece is a regular part of any Creative Arts' instruction. Students learn that feedback is part of learning and it is not something to be offended by or to be taken personally. It is something helpful. The goal is the improvement of skills and evaluation is incorporated at every step of the process. Each arts discipline has built in parameters to ensure that critique is a valuable experience and greatly contributes to the success of the final piece.

**Collaboration** – Most arts disciplines are collaborative in nature. Through the arts, children practice working together, sharing responsibility, and compromising with others to accomplish a common goal. When a child has a part to play



in a music ensemble, or a theatre or dance production, they begin to understand that their contribution is necessary for the success of the group. Through these experiences children gain confidence and start to learn that their contributions have value even if they don't have the biggest role.



**Dedication** – When students get to practice following through with artistic endeavors that result in a finished product or performance, they learn to associate dedication with a feeling of accomplishment. They practice developing healthy work habits of being on time for rehearsals and performances, respecting the contributions of others, and putting effort into the success of the final piece. In the Performing Arts, the reward for dedication is the warm feeling of an audience's applause that comes rushing over you, making all your efforts worthwhile.

Accountability – When children practice creating something collaboratively they get used to the idea that their actions affect other people. They learn that when they are not prepared or on-time, that other people suffer. Through the arts, students also learn that it is important to admit that you made a mistake and take responsibility for it. Because mistakes are a regular part of the process of learning in the arts, children begin to see that mistakes happen. We acknowledge them, learn from them and move on.





# **Bodies of Work**

Congratulations to our Visual Arts HSC candidates who submitted their Bodies of Work to the HSC Marking Centre. Many of the expressive forms were represented, including painting, drawing, graphic design and digital media.

The body of work is developed during the HSC course and provides the opportunity for the full range of students electing Visual Arts to engage in artmaking as a practice.

The body of work is externally examined. A selection of one or more works is made at the conclusion of the course and is submitted as evidence of what students know and can do in the practice of artmaking.

ARTEXPRESS is an annual series of exhibitions of exemplary artworks created by New South Wales visual arts students for the Higher School Certificate examination.


















# **MUSIC**

Music is one of life's simple joys; it helps calm the mind.


#### Sense of Achievement



# YEAR 7 and 8 GIFTED AND TALENTED (GaT) EXCURSION TO 'POP UP GLOBE THEATRE'

On the 6 November, the Year 7 and 8 GaT classes had the privilege of attending the 'Pop Up Globe Theatre' to see the William Shakespeare's play *A Midsummer Night's Dream.* 

A Midsummer Night's Dream is a comedic play about four young people being manipulated by a powerful flower which controls who the person falls in love with, as well as the fight between a fairy king and queen for the custody of an Indian boy.

The interesting thing about the performance was that all the roles were played by men, like how they were in sixteenth century which made it feel as though we were experiencing it back then. The play told the story of the fairies using Maori culture and language, the fairy scenes where spoken in Maori which was hard to understand but due to our research on the play, we knew exactly what was happening.

The play included modern twists, such as calling the 'mechanicals', tradies, who performed for the king and queen of Athens' wedding. A Midsummer Night's Dream became interactive by characters walking through and talking with the audience, not to forget we also got sprayed with fake blood towards the end of the performance.

# 2018 Duke of Edinburgh International Award Practice and Qualifying Adventurous Journeys

Kingsgrove High School has had 13 students committing to The Duke of Edinburgh International Award in 2019.

Each student has set themselves goals to achieve in developing a Skill, improving in Physical Recreation and committing to a Community Service over 13 hours throughout the year. The Award culminates in students completing two Adventurous Journeys.

The History excursion focused on Civics and Citizenship, linked to the Australian Curriculum, as students gained a deeper understanding and appreciation of Australian History, through valuable 'hands-on' learning experiences of 'real history' beyond the classroom. Highlights included:

- Mount Ainslie
- The Snowy Mountains

- The Australian Parliament House

At each site, students had the opportunity to actively participate in a range of engaging, challenging and enjoyable activities to enrich their learning. ### **Marine Studies**



### Why choose Marine Studies?

The oceans, inland waterways and other bodies of water cover 75% of the earth's surface and influence all life forms of life on this planet. All life forms depend on the ocean, the oceans are crucial to our survival as it not only produces 70% of the world's oxygen but it also provides a rich food source for many coastal populations. In Marine Studies, students are part of an interactive learning environment that focuses on understanding the sustainability issues present in our marine environments.




